SYNOPSIS (100 words)

In *Where's Foster*, social workers dispel myths about why children are removed from their biological parents, breaking down their overwhelming workload. Lawyers uncover the harsh reality of young children navigating the legal system. Advocacy organizations try to keep children safe and away from predators. An eclectic array of interviews from foster care alumni explore their connections (or lack thereof) with social workers, the fragile bond with each foster home, how trust can fall apart, and how those unable to adapt spent time in group homes. The film concludes with alumni success stories, working to remove the stigma of foster care.





SYNOPSIS (250 words)

There are currently over 400,000 children in foster care in the United States. The abuse and neglect which land these children in foster homes can range from a parent's drug addiction, to the inability to care for the child due to illness.

Where's Foster? discusses the infamous "knock at the door," dispelling myths about why children are removed from their biological parents. Candid interviews with lawyers uncover the harsh reality of young children navigating the legal system – the constant battle between social workers, foster and biological parents, and family court judges deciding their futures. Advocacy organizations detail their efforts to keep children safe from harm, off the streets, and away from sexual predators. Social workers and childcare advocates break down the overwhelming workload of the under-resourced system.

Where's Foster? features an eclectic array of individuals sharing their experiences in foster care. Journeys hallmarked by connections (or lack thereof) with social workers, and the fragile bond with each foster home. They explore how trust can fall apart, and how they were seen as financial assets. Some homes came with uncaring parents, while others came with tough rules and harsh punishments. For those unable to adapt, they were sent to group homes, managed by underpaid young adults lacking proper training. This can lead to more trauma, delinquency, and homelessness.

The film concludes with the success stories of these foster care alumni. They're activists, artists, and even foster parents, working to remove the stigma of foster care from past and future generations.

SYNOPSIS (350 words)

There are currently more than 400,000 children in foster care in the United States. The abuse and neglect which land these children in foster homes can range from a parent's drug addiction, to the inability to care for the child due to an illness.

Where's Foster? grants access to Washington DC's Child and Family Services, to discuss the infamous "knock at the door," and dispel myths about why children are removed from their biological parents. Candid interviews with the New York lawyers of Brooklyn Defenders uncover the harsh reality of young children navigating the legal system — the constant battle between social workers, foster and biological parents, and family court judges deciding their futures. Organizations such as the Sasha Bruce Place, Children's Rights, and the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children shine a light on their crusade to keep children safe from harm, off the streets, and out of the hands of sexual predators. These perspectives are buttressed by interviews of social workers (past and present), and childcare advocates who break down the overwhelming workload of the under-resourced American foster care system.

Conversely, *Where's Foster?* features an eclectic array of individuals sharing their experiences in foster care. Their journeys are complex and nuanced, hallmarked by their connection (or lack thereof) with social workers, the little time they typically had to bond with each foster home, and the scarce few families which were available. They explore how trust can often fall apart, and how often foster parents see them merely as financial assets. Some homes came with limited involvement on behalf of the parents, while others came with tough rules and harsh punishments. For those children unable to adapt, they found themselves in group homes, managed by underpaid young adults lacking proper training. This can lead to more trauma, mental illness, a "foster care to prison pipeline," and homelessness.

But the abandonment, neglect, and abuse is seen through the success stories of these foster care alumni. They've gone on to be activists, artists, and even foster parents, working to remove the stigma of foster care and to uplift the next generation.

DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

I was motivated to tell this story, because I was raised in my great grandmother's home in Mount Vernon, New York, where she was the foster mother of six foster children. In my teens, I had two young relatives placed in foster care, and we discovered they were abused and neglected by their foster parents. While serving in the Army, most of my peers shared horror stories about foster care.

I saw other documentaries about foster care over the years, but they always followed young people in foster care, and I always wanted to know what happened to the kids who are now adults. How did they adjust to life after foster care? That's the main element that separates my film from others.

My goal is to bring awareness to the decreased number of good foster homes. I want the audience to walk away from the film, realizing they are the ones who can spark change, by opening their homes to children in need.

JUDITH SCHAGRIN Retired Social Worker


